Welcome!

In this lesson, students will use Tynker's AI (artificial intelligence) hand tracking model to tickle a monster with their finger! Students will begin by sketching different monster costumes on a piece of paper. Next, students will move on to the DIY module where they'll reinforce coding concepts to program a project called "Tickle Monster." The DIY module includes a sample project, step-by-step tutorial, code blocks to help students get started, and ideas on how to modify their project. Time permitting, students will combine code, creativity, and common Latin word stems as they create their own "root monster", as described in the "Extended Activities" section of this guide.

Important: Students will need a working webcam in order to complete the project.

How to Prepare

This activity is designed for self-directed learning. Your role will be to help students individually and facilitate as students complete the coding activities on their own. The best way to prepare is to:

1. **Familiarize yourself with the material.** After selecting your Tynker lesson (Tickle Monster), read through the teacher guide and complete the activity before assigning it to students. This will allow you to troubleshoot anything in advance and plan for potential questions from your students.
2. **Sign up for a teacher account.** Creating a free teacher account will allow you to access teacher guides, answer keys, and tons of additional resources. You'll also be able to create free accounts for your students, monitor their progress, and see their projects.
3. **Create student accounts.** From your teacher account, you can easily create free student accounts for all your students. This will allow them to save their projects and progress, so they can continue coding when they get home!

Activity

Overview

Objectives

Students will...

- Design and animate a monster
- Apply coding concepts such as conditional loops, detect conditions, simple pose detection, simple landmarks, and simple costume handling
- Use code blocks to create an interactive project that uses Tynker's hand tracking AI

Materials

- **For web:** Computers, laptops, or Chromebooks (1 per student)

Vocabulary

- **Code:** The language that tells a computer what to do
- **Actor:** A Tynker character or object that can talk and interact with others
- **Costumes:** Different appearances for an Actor
- **Stage:** The background of the project where the Actors are placed
- **Sequence:** The order in which steps or events happen
- **Command:** A specific action or instruction that tells the computer to do something
- **Loop:** An action that repeats one or more commands over and over
- **Conditional loop:** A loop that performs one or more commands as long as the specified condition is met
- **Artificial Intelligence:** The idea of machines (such as computers) demonstrating intelligence, similar to how our brain works

Getting Started (10 minutes)

- Show students the completed sample project by clicking this image in the tutorial:



- Next, inform students that they'll need to design their own monster later today. Prepare students by asking them to sketch three different costumes on a piece of paper: 1 idle ("normal") costume and 2 other costumes where it looks like the monster is reacting to being tickled. Here's an example:

DIY Module (30 minutes)

This lesson has one DIY (do-it-yourself) module. Facilitate as students complete the Tickle Monster module on their own:

Tickle Monster (DIY)

- In this DIY, students will use Tynker's hand detection blocks to create a project where it looks like they're tickling a monster. Additionally, students will create their own monster using Tynker's Drawing Tool.
- Note that this project utilizes an AI model. This model has already been "trained" to recognize the human body by being shown many photos of people and data about what's in the photos. Now the model is ready to be used in the project, where it can "find" your students' hands using their webcam.
- Coding activities include drawing a monster, adding different costumes to the monster, enabling hand tracking, and programming the monster to look like it's being tickled.
- Make sure students follow the step-by-step instructions and drag blocks from the tutorial tab to the center coding area.
- Page 3 of the tutorial instructs students to draw their own monster. If students want to learn more about what they can do with the Drawing Tool, direct them to this link:

- Are students struggling to create their own monster? Encourage students to use the provided template monster to help them get started. Here's what it looks like:



Next, ask them to try coloring the monster and add costumes. Let's see what other unique features your students will add to their monster!

- Check for understanding by asking students why we need to draw more than one costume for the monster. (Answer example: To create a laughing animation, we need the monster to have at least two costumes.)
- Make sure students give meaningful names to their costumes. This will make it easier for them to keep track of all the wonderful costumes they draw! For example, a costume name of "tickled" is a better name than a costume named "111".
- Make sure students include a background. They can either draw their own background or select one from Tynker's Media Library.
- Did students finish early? Direct their attention to the last page of the tutorial which includes ideas on how to further expand on their project.

Extended Activities

Root Monster

- In this activity, students will create a monster using Latin word stems. Here's a list to help you get started:

Uni (one)	Cornu (horn)	Lingua (tongue)
Bi (two)	Capit (head)	Dent (tooth)
Tri (three)	Oculus (eye)	Magnus (large)
Quad (four)	Nasus (nose)	Micro (small)
Quin (five)	Auris (ear)	Ped (foot)

- Next, ask students to use at least 4 Latin stems to create a Latin name that describes their monster.
 - Example: Magnustrioculus Quaddent (large three-eyed, four-tooth)
- Make sure students write the Latin name and English translation of their monster at the top of their paper. Then, ask them to draw and color a picture of what their creature might look like based on its name. Time permitting, ask students to create and animate their root monster using Tynker!

How do I prepare for Tickle Monster?

Familiarize yourself with the material. After selecting your Tynker lesson (Tickle Monster), read through the teacher guide and complete the activity before assigning it to students. This will allow you to troubleshoot anything in advance and plan for potential questions from your students.

How does this project use AI?

This project utilizes a pre-trained AI body tracking model. The AI model has been trained on a large dataset of images featuring the human body. When your students interact with the project, the model analyzes the incoming video feed to identify and follow the movements of the user's body landmarks, specifically of the hands, providing accurate and instantaneous tracking. Using Tynker's AI blocks, students can apply the AI technology to build interactive, sophisticated projects. Let's see what your students will create!

Who is this activity for?

Tickle Monster is intended for students in grades 3-5 (U.S.) or years 4-6 (U.K.) with some coding experience.

How do my students code their project?

The Tickle Monster DIY module includes a workspace for students to code their project. The section on the left is a tutorial tab that gives step-by-step directions and describes what is happening in each step. Students can code their project by dragging code blocks to the middle coding panel.


What will my students learn?

Students will combine creativity and coding concepts to create an interactive project called "Tickle Monster" that uses Tynker's AI model. Additionally, students can also expand on their project while experimenting with new code blocks. In this process, students will develop debugging and logical reasoning skills.

What do the code blocks do?

Below is sample code for the Actors.

 **Stage:**




Scratch code blocks for the Stage: section:

- on start** (orange block): ← Run the code attached to this block when the Play button is clicked.
- start hands detection** (teal block with hand icon): ← Start the AI model that is trained to detect hand landmarks.
- show detection** (teal block): ← Show a visualization for any AI sensing that is active.



Tickle Monster:



Scratch code blocks for the Tickle Monster: section:

- on start** (orange block): ← Run the code attached to this block when the Play button is clicked.
- switch to costume idle** (purple block): ← Change the monster's costume to the "idle" pose.
- forever if touching Right Pointer Fingertip ?** (orange block): ← Run the code inside this loop if the user's right pointer finger is touching the monster.
- switch to costume tickled** (purple block): ← Change the monster's costume to the "tickled" pose.
- play sound cartoon giggle until done** (purple block): ← Play a cartoon giggle sound.
- switch to costume idle** (purple block): ← Change the monster's costume to the "idle" pose.

Note: This is an open-ended DIY project. Above is an example that uses the provided code blocks to create a Tickle Monster project.
